The Constitution created a strong federal government to bring the states together to work for the good of the nation while balancing their rights to independence and autonomy. The legislative branch creates the laws and the executive branch enforces them. Laws are put into practice by the justice system including the FBI, state justice systems, law enforcement bodies, and the trial system.
